TITLE 5. MATTERS AFFECTING PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES
CHAPTER 176. DISCLOSURE OF CERTAIN RELATIONSHIPS WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENT
OFFICERS: PROVIDING PUBLIC ACCESS TO CERTAIN INFORMATION**

Sec. 176.003. CONFLICTS DISCLOSURE STATEMENT REQUIRED. (a) A local government officer shall file a conflicts disclosure statement with respect to a vendor if:

- (1) the vendor enters into a contract with the local governmental entity or the local governmental entity is considering entering into a contract with the vendor; and
- (2) the vendor:
 - (A) has an employment or other business relationship with the local government officer or a family member of the officer that results in the officer or family member receiving taxable income that exceeds \$2,500 during the 12-month period preceding the date that the officer becomes aware that:
 - (i) a contract between the local governmental entity and vendor has been executed; or
 - (ii) the local governmental entity is considering entering into a contract with the vendor;
 - (B) has given to the local government officer or a family member of the officer one or more gifts that have an aggregate value of more than \$100 in the 12-month period preceding the date the officer becomes aware that:
 - (i) a contract between the local governmental entity and vendor has been executed; or
 - (ii) the local governmental entity is considering entering into a contract with the vendor; or
 - (C) has a family relationship with the local government officer.

This notice complies with Texas Government Code Chapter 551, Open Meetings Act, Section 551.041 (Notice of Meeting Requirements); Section 551.043 (Time and Accessibility of Notice Requirements); and Section 551.053 (Notice Requirements of a Political Subdivision Extending into Four or More Counties) and Section 551.127 (Videoconference Call). 1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Pat Sims called the meeting to order at 1:31 p.m. and noted that a quorum was present.

2. INVOCATION

Mr. Oscar Ostos gave the invocation.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comments were made.

4. MINUTES

Judge Dan Looten motioned to accept the minutes from the Board of Directors meeting held on January 22, 2026. Judge Rank Cogdell seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote

5. PRPC SPECIAL DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVE BOARD MEMBER APPOINTMENT

Mr. Michael Peters informed the Board of Directors that the PRPC Bylaws call for two members representing special districts in the Panhandle to serve on the PRPC Board of Directors. During its January meeting, the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA) Board demonstrated its support for the appointment of Mr. Eddie Edwards to replace Mac Smith on the PRPC Board of Directors. Article VI, Section 8 of the PRPC Bylaws calls for the appointed representatives to be filled by the Chairperson, with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors.

Judge Nancy Tanner motioned for the Board of Directors to support the appointment of Mr. Eddie Edwards, representing the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA), with a term that will expire on October 30th, 2028. Judge Shawn Ballew seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

6. PRPC VOUCHERS FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 2026

Mr. Trent Taylor informed the Board of Directors that the PRPC vouchers serve as tangible evidence of financial transactions, allowing review of all expenditures. This transparency builds trust and acts as a deterrent against fraudulent activities within our organization by requiring supporting documentation for every expenditure. January Vouchers total \$2,417,584.51

Mayor Cole Stanley motioned for the Board of Directors to approve the voucher for the month of January 2026. Judge Nancy Tanner seconded the motion; the motion passed by unanimous vote.

7. WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT CHILD CARE QUALITY PURCHASES: CURRICULUM, LEARNING MATERIALS, CLASSROOM ITEMS, PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING, AND SUPPLIES

Ms. Heather Reid informed the Board of Directors that the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has contracted with the Panhandle Workforce Development Board (PWDB) / PRPC to utilize Child Care Quality 2% and 4% Activities Grants to provide Quality Improvement activities such as curriculum, learning materials for existing classrooms, and learning materials for expansion classrooms for Texas Panhandle Child Care Providers. The PWDB has tasked its sub-recipient, Workforce Solutions Panhandle (WSP), with assisting local Child Care Providers with maintaining or increasing their Texas Rising Star rating. The TRS program is a quality-based rating system of Child Care Providers participating in TWC's Subsidized Child Care program. TRS certification is available to Licensed and Registered facilities that exceed the State's Minimum Child Care Regulation Standards and meet the certification criteria in such categories as Director and Staff qualifications, caregiver-child interactions, age-appropriate curricula, learning materials, and outdoor equipment. Workforce Development staff have identified local Child Care Providers in need of curriculum and learning materials. The FY2025 Child Care Quality plan allowed for the support of programs going through their Annual Monitoring Visit, programs going through initial onboarding to TRS, programs expanding slots for children, and curriculum (Frog Street, Teaching Strategies, Learning Beyond Paper, and Circle). Through Lakeshore Learning Materials, LLC, the providers will be able to select from a range of products preselected by Workforce Development, allowing each program to purchase the items needed for their classrooms to retain or improve their TRS status or expand their classrooms. Curriculum will be available through Frog Street, Teaching Strategies, Learning Beyond Paper, and Circle. All purchases will be made through the TIPS Coop or the Buy Board Coop. For FY2026, a Child Care Quality Budget of 1.112 million dollars has been presented and accepted by the Child Care Advisory Committee and Workforce Development Board. PWDB proposes to make purchases at this time, for Providers who are going through Annual Monitoring Visits or Recertification of their Program, Providers that have expanded their facilities, and Providers requesting support in purchasing the appropriate Curriculum to meet their center's needs. This authorization will allow staff to timely support Texas Panhandle child care providers in maintaining or improving their Texas Rising Star ratings and expanding high-quality child care capacity across the region. PRPC is a member of the Coop purchasing programs. The Interlocal Purchasing System (TIPS) and BuyBoard Purchasing Cooperative allow PRPC/Workforce Development access to purchasing contracts. Both of these purchasing cooperatives conduct competitive procurements with in-house personnel and legal counsel to enable government agencies to make purchases using their purchasing contracts. The purchases for the project described above can be made through the TIPS and Buy Board purchasing process. The total cost for these projects is up to \$800,000.00, and funds for this purchase would come from existing Workforce Development Child Care Quality funds.

Judge Mitchell Locke motioned for the Board of Directors to authorize the Executive Director to purchase the Curriculum, Child Care Learning materials as described above from Lakeshore Learning, Frog Street, Teaching Strategies, Learning Beyond Paper,

and Circle for the amount of no more than \$800,000.00, with grant funds from the TWC Workforce Development Child Care Quality grants. Judge Michael Clawson seconded the motion; the motion passed by unanimous vote.

8. LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES LOCAL PROJECT MANAGEMENT SERVICES INTERLOCAL CONTRACTS – TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE

Ms. Paige Goodell informed the Board of Directors that for over twenty years, PRPC Staff has assisted cities with the development of Master Parks Plans and applications to Texas Parks & Wildlife under their available recreation grant programs. This past year, PRPC Staff assisted five communities in building applications through the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's Local Parks grant programs. Staff has been notified that the Cities of Childress, Spearman, Turkey, and Wellington were approved for funding at Texas Parks & Wildlife's January 2026 Commission meeting. The City of Childress sought assistance from the Local Government Services (LGS) Department to apply for funding under the Small Community Grant Program for the installation of a splashpad in Fair Park. The City of Childress has had to keep its city swimming pool closed in recent seasons due to costly repairs. Additionally, the city had to move to Stage 4 of its Drought Contingency Plan in 2025. The splashpad will create an alternative water feature for the community to enjoy that will save water through utilizing water recirculation. The City was awarded \$150,000 in grant funding and has requested that PRPC be contracted through an interlocal agreement to provide project administration, with \$30,000 allocated for administrative services. Additionally, LGS staff worked with the City of Spearman to apply for funding under the Small Community Grant Program to install an accessible splashpad in Martin Park to serve children of all abilities. The city was awarded \$150,000 in grant funding and has requested PRPC's administrative services for this project for \$30,000. The City of Turkey also worked with PRPC staff to apply for funding under the Small Community Grant Program to construct a pedestrian walking loop, basketball court, and restroom in Turkey City Park. The city was awarded \$150,000 in grant funding and has requested PRPC's administrative services for this project for \$30,000. Finally, LGS assisted the City of Wellington in developing an application under the Nonurban Outdoor Program to support comprehensive updates to Ellison Park, including new playground equipment, resurfaced tennis courts, pickleball courts, sand volleyball, sports pits for horseshoe and cornhole, t-ball fields, two gazebos, a xeriscape garden, concrete walking trails, and a smart irrigation system. The city was awarded \$608,966 for the project and has requested PRPC's administrative support for a sum of \$70,000.

All of these park projects will be highly beneficial to the residents of the Texas Panhandle as they make significant improvements to park facilities and increase the recreation diversity offered within each of the communities. The project administration capacity of PRPC staff aligns very well with the local needs associated with implementing all four of these projects.

Judge Nancy Tanner motioned for the Board of Directors to authorize the Executive Director to execute four respective Interlocal Cooperation Contracts between the abovementioned cities and for the PRPC to provide Project Administration Services for their Texas Parks & Wildlife grant-funded projects. Judge John Howard seconded the motion. Mr. Phillip Self abstained; the motion passed with a sufficient number of votes.

9. LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES TxCDBG COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUND AND DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION PROGRAM PROJECT MANAGEMENT SERVICES INTERLOCAL CONTRACT AMENDMENTS

Mr. Alex Guerrero informed the Board of Directors that the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) has long been the funding agency for the Community Development Block Grant (TxCDBG) Program in the State of Texas. In 2024, TDA implemented a new application process that included an intake of applications from all interested communities under a Phase I - Community Application. Communities were subsequently ranked according to scoring criteria, and those identified to be within funding range were invited to submit a Phase II - Project Application. In late 2024, TDA solicited applications for the Phase I 2025/2026 TxCDBG Community Development Fund Grant program, and PRPC assisted sixteen Panhandle communities in writing, developing, and submitting applications to this long-standing program that supports basic water and sewer infrastructure improvements. In addition, PRPC assisted six communities with Phase I 2025 Downtown Revitalization Program (DRP) applications, which have traditionally focused on sidewalk infrastructure improvements and lighting. This body passed no-cost interlocal agreements for application development for each of these communities in order to comply with TDA requirements pertaining to procurement. The no-cost interlocal agreement is to maintain the long-standing history of providing application development at no cost to Panhandle communities. However, this interlocal agreement is designed to be easily amendable contingent upon funding for project management services. Three communities received communication from TDA that they were in line for 2025 Program Year funding and were invited to submit a Phase II Community Development Fund application in 2025 with PRPC's assistance. Additionally, one community was invited to submit a Phase II 2025 Downtown Revitalization Program application. All four communities have since received grant awards, which began on February 1, 2026. This agenda item is to allow for the authorization of the Interlocal Amendment to carry out the administrative function and project management activities, should the following projects receive grant funding. These activities consist of:

- Project Management
- Financial Management
- Environmental Review
- Acquisition
- Construction Management
- Fair Housing/Equal Opportunity
- Audit/Close-out Procedures

Below is a list of the four Panhandle communities that are receiving a grant award. This list includes: project type, amount of TxCDBG funding, the match amount committed by each community, and the amount that will be paid to the PRPC for general administration functions associated with the grant.

Judge Christy Dyer motioned for the Board of Directors to authorize the Executive Director to execute amendments to the Interlocal Cooperation Contracts for PRPC to provide TxCDBG administration services. Judge Shawn Ballew seconded the motion. Judge Mitchell Locke and Mr. Oscar Ostos abstained; the motion carried with a sufficient number of votes.

10. LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES 2026 TxDOT COORDINATED CALL APPLICATION - PANHANDLE REGIONAL MOBILITY CONNECT – PILOT PROGRAM

Mr. Alex Guerrero informed the Board of Directors that the Local Government Services Department submitted an application to TxDOT under the 2026 Coordinated Call for Projects for a two-year Planning and Demonstration Pilot titled Panhandle Regional Mobility Connect (PRMC) – Pilot Program. The PRMC Pilot is a regionwide mobility management initiative serving all 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. The project focuses on establishing a comprehensive transportation asset inventory and coordination framework to improve visibility, alignment, and utilization of existing public, nonprofit, healthcare, and human service transportation resources. This effort builds directly upon priorities identified in the adopted 2022 - 2026 Regionally Coordinated Transportation Plan (RCTP), ongoing development of the 2027 - 2031 RCTP, and findings from the TxDOT-funded Return Home from Hospitalization planning project. These efforts documented persistent coordination gaps, particularly related to hospital discharge transportation, rural referral pathways, eligibility clarity, and system-wide information access. Rather than funding new vehicles or expanding service operations, the PRMC Pilot strengthens planning infrastructure by:

- Developing a standardized regional transportation asset inventory
- Integrating and enhancing the existing One Ride platform as part of a broader coordination framework
- Demonstrating coordinated referral use cases, including hospital discharge and human service coordination
- Producing evaluation findings and sustainability recommendations for future regional implementation

Project partners include PROMPT, Amarillo City Transit (ACT), Panhandle Community Services (PCS), regional hospital districts, human service agencies, and a procured technical vendor to support system configuration and evaluation. The total funding request is \$150,000, with the requested use of Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) to satisfy the required match obligation. The anticipated project period would begin on September 1st, 2026 and extend through August 31st, 2028. The application deadline occurred the day following the January 2026 Board meeting; therefore, staff proceeded with submission to ensure compliance with TxDOT's required timeline.

Judge Rank Cogdell motioned for the Board of Directors to authorize the Executive Director to submit an application to the 2026 TxDOT Coordinated Call for Projects to develop the Panhandle Regional Mobility Connect - Pilot Program and subsequent contract, should the proposed project be funded. Judge Mitchell Locke seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

11. LOCAL GOVERNMENT RECRUITMENT SERVICES INTERLOCAL CONTRACT – CITY OF SPEARMAN

Mr. Max Seymour informed the Board of Directors that over the past decade, PRPC Staff has assisted many cities in the Texas Panhandle with administrative services, ranging from contractual city management services to city manager searches to master parks planning. One of the most increasingly demanded services is assistance with the recruitment of professional staff by cities. Recently, the PRPC was approached by the City of Spearman to conduct a professional search for their new City Manager. The City of Spearman has considered the PRPC's scope of services as it relates to assistance with a professional search and plans to authorize an interlocal agreement to perform these services. The inclusion of this agenda item will allow the PRPC Board of Directors to consider entering into an interlocal agreement with the City of Spearman for PRPC to continue to work with and assist them in this process. The contract will be focused so that the services can be rendered expeditiously and in a quality manner so that the City can resume normal operations quickly. Compensation will be rated at \$65.00 per hour, with job postings and travel compensated additionally with a set floor and ceiling to ensure that both parties mutually benefit from the agreement. The following options will be made available for inclusion in contracts:

Search Services

1. Develop a Job Description
2. Post the Position notice as directed by the City.
3. Receive copies of all applications submitted to the City and review them.
4. Set up interviews with qualified candidates.
5. Check references and internet history as directed by the City.
6. Make recommendations on a short list of qualified applicants.
7. Contract negotiations with a qualified applicant.
8. On-site services as required by the City Council related to the search.

Judge Dan Looten motioned for the Board of Directors to authorize the Executive Director to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract with the City of Spearman and to conduct a formal City Manager search. Ms. Ronae Bunn seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

12. REGIONAL SERVICES INTERLOCAL AGREEMENTS FOR ADMINISTRATION OF A HAZARD MITIGATION GRANT

Ms. Lori Gunn informed the Board of Directors that the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program is a federal program that jurisdictions can only participate in if they have an approved hazard mitigation plan. The Hazard Mitigation Grant Program is authorized under Section 404 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act. PRPC staff have been working with the majority of our counties on their plan update. This grant program allows sub-recipient management costs to be utilized for the administration of the project. These funds are provided at a 100% federal cost-share; there is no local match required for the administration costs. Currently, the City of Memphis has been approved for funding for warning sirens. By installing sirens, the City of Memphis will be working to mitigate known vulnerabilities. The Unified Hazard Mitigation Assistance Grant Programs (HMA) provide grants to states and local governments to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures after a major disaster declaration. The purpose of the HMA is to provide a critical opportunity to reduce the loss of life and property due to natural hazards and disasters and to enable mitigation measures to be implemented during the immediate recovery from a disaster. PRPC's Regional Services department has been asked to administer these projects, utilizing the administration funds provided by FEMA.

Judge Nancy Tanner motioned for the Board of Directors to consider the approval and authorize the Executive Director to execute interlocal agreements for professional services from the PRPC's Regional Services Department on the FEMA-awarded Hazard Mitigation Grant Project. Judge Shawn Ballew seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

13. REGIONAL SERVICES FY26 STATE HOMELAND SECURITY PROGRAM APPLICATION RESOLUTIONS

Ms. Lori Gunn informed the Board of Directors that the FY26 State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) grant application period opened on February 17, 2026. This year's applications are due to the Homeland Security Grants Division of the Governor's Office no later than 5:00 PM on March 16, 2026. The purpose of this grant program is to support local and regional efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare for threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to public safety. The SHSP plays a significant role in the implementation of the National Preparedness System by providing funding that can be used to build, sustain, and deliver core capabilities critical to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of having a secure and resilient nation. The program has changed rather significantly in the past few years. It used to be that the region would determine how the funds would be used based on an evaluation of needs and priorities. Now, federal spending requirements have to be factored into that determination. In fact, to a certain extent, the federal spending requirements now outweigh the evaluation of needs and priorities. For FY26, in addition to ensuring that at least 30% of the funding received by the region is spent on Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Activities (LETPA), we also have to make sure that at least 3% of the region's FY26 allocation is spent on the first three of the National Priority areas.

- 1) Enhancing Community Preparedness & Resilience (at least 3%);
- 2) Protection of Soft Target/Crowded Places (at least 3%);
- 3) Intelligence and Information Sharing & Analysis (at least 3%);

- 4) Combating Domestic Violent Extremism (3% under competitive area);
- 5) Enhancing Election Security (3% under competitive area); and
- 6) Enhancing Cybersecurity (apply under SLCGP).

What makes meeting these federal funding requirements even more challenging is that we do not know how much funding the Panhandle will receive for FY26, nor will we know that until the projects have been funded. Now, for over 10 years, the PRPC has annually applied for funding to maintain four keystone projects that benefit the entire region. They include:

1. The Regional PANCOM Interoperable Public Safety Communications system (which primarily supports the core capability of Operational Communications);
2. The EOP Update Project (which supports the Planning core capability);
3. The Panhandle-Area Regional Information System or PARIS (which chiefly serves the core capability of Public Information & Warning); and
4. The Regional Planning & Coordination Project (which likewise supports the core capability of Planning).

1. **FY26 Regional PANCOM Maintenance and Operations**

This proposal is for a continuation project. As currently proposed, the project will cover approximately 50% of the annual costs of maintaining the PANCOM system.

2. **FY26 EOP Update Project**

This proposal is for a continuation project. This project would provide Emergency Operations Planning (EOP) assistance to counties/cities in the region, to support the EOP planning process in FY26.

3. **FY26 PARIS Maintenance Project**

This proposal is for a continuation project. SHSP funds were used to purchase a license for the Panhandle Area Regional Information System (PARIS) for use by the region's emergency management officials and regional first responders through mutual aid asset inventory and local/ regional mass notification capabilities. It has been determined that this project will satisfy the National Priority of Protection of Soft Target/Crowded Places.

4. **FY26 Regional Planning & Coordination Project**

This proposal is for a continuation project. The project is intended to offset the PRPC's costs of administering the regional SHSP program and performing all the planning work required to support the SHSP program in the Panhandle.

The deadline for the submission of the FY26 SHSP project applications is March 16th. By approving these resolutions, the Board is not finally approving the funding of these projects. However, you will be asked to consider approving the PREMAC's FY26 SHSP prioritized project list during your meeting in March, and these projects will appear on that list.

Judge Michael Clawson motioned for the Board of Directors to approve the submission of the five regional projects described in this agenda item to the Public Safety Office of the Governor's Office for consideration under the FY26 State Homeland Security Grant program by the March 16, 2026, submission deadline. Judge Shawn Ballew seconded the motion; the motion carried by unanimous vote.

15. MISCELLANEOUS NON-ACTION INFORMATION ITEMS

- A. Comments from the Executive Director. The next board meeting is scheduled for March 19, 2026. The Audit Committee will meet before the board meeting on March 19, 2026, at 11:00 AM in the same meeting room. Audit Committee members will find an envelope containing relevant materials at their seats. The current Audit Committee Members are Judge Kim Jones, Judge John Howard, Judge Christy Dyer, Commissioner Juan Cantu, and Mr. Oscar Ostos. The auditors are currently onsite reviewing organizational financial records. The contractors are continuing work related to the installation and commissioning of the new chiller system. The control system is currently being configured to integrate with the new equipment. A small amount of additional pipe insulation remains to be installed. Once this work is completed, staff anticipate beginning operation of the new chiller and associated equipment. Additionally, reconstruction work is underway in the entry and basement areas, including the installation of new ceilings, vents, and lighting. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2026, Texas House Bill 3512 requires annual AI awareness training for state and local government employees whose job duties involve computer use for 25% or more of their work time. This training will be administered through the Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR). Completion and certification of the training will be required by August 31 each year. At this time, specific training providers have not yet been designated. Staff recently met with Russell Ezzell of Angelo State University, who leads the Regional Security Operations Center serving the Texas Panhandle. Through a state-supported program, cities and counties are eligible to install CrowdStrike Falcon antivirus software and receive complimentary Network Operations Center monitoring services. These services provide proactive cybersecurity monitoring designed to help prevent and respond to cyber threats, particularly ransomware attacks. Special districts may also participate but must first request authorization through the Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR). Informational slides outlining the program have been provided to board members. The Texas Rising Star initiative currently has six mentors assigned to support childcare providers throughout the Texas Panhandle. Each Rising Star Education Center typically receives monthly onsite visits. The program currently includes approximately 98–102 participating providers. At present, 83% of centers maintain certification above a two-star rating. The star rating system provides increased reimbursement per student for higher-rated centers, which incentivizes providers to focus on educational quality in addition to childcare services. Centers working toward initial certification or higher ratings receive more frequent visits to support their progress. New state requirements will also require attendance verification for the day when mentors conduct site visits.

Local Government Services TxCDBG 2026 Downtown Revitalization Program – Interlocal Agreements for Application Development Services

BACKGROUND

PRPC Staff has worked with Panhandle communities to write applications and implement various projects through the Community Development Block Grant (TxCDBG) Program since 1983. Through the CDBG program, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) offers different funding opportunities that include: Community Development Fund Program, State Urgent Need (SUN) disaster relief, and the Downtown Revitalization Program.

The Downtown Revitalization Program (DRP) aims to eliminate slum and blight conditions in downtown areas by funding public infrastructure improvements within a community's downtown district, economic commerce area, and areas around city squares primarily serving non-governmental buildings. Several cities have already expressed interest in applying for funding to improve blighted conditions through infrastructure upgrades in their downtown areas.

For the 2026 DRP funding cycle:

- Maximum grant award is \$1,000,000.
- Continuation of the two-phased application process.
- Eligibility limited to communities within the state's allocation range for the DRP/Main Street Set-Aside Program (2026 Statewide Allocation: ~\$8.4 million).
- Expanded eligible activities for communities with a low-to-moderate income (LMI) percentage above 51%.

Following the format that has become the new standard for TxCDBG applications, an interlocal agreement has been developed for PRPC to assist communities with an application to the Downtown Revitalization Program. In order to comply with TDA requirements as well as maintain the long-established tradition of conducting application development at no charge to communities in the region, the interlocal agreement is two parts:

Part 1 - Application development will be conducted at no cost.

Part 2 - An option for an Amendment to be considered contingent upon funding for Project Management Services.

Historically, these are all activities conducted by PRPC Staff on projects and applications. However, in order to comply with TDA requirements, it is necessary for the following cities to enter into an interlocal agreement with PRPC for application development activities to ensure programmatic compliance. Communities applying to the Downtown Revitalization Program for 2026 include the following: Canadian, Higgins, Memphis, Miami, Turkey, and Dalhart

RECOMMENDATION:

PRPC staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the Executive Director of the PRPC to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract between the above-noted communities, respectively, and the PRPC to provide TxCDBG Downtown Revitalization application services at no cost, with contingency for administrative services to be amended at the localities' discretion if their project is funded.

AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES

WHEREAS, this Contract is made and entered into this the ___ day of _____, 2026 by and between the City, acting by its duly (authorized official), after obtaining a resolution of its governing body authorizing this contract and the PANHANDLE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION (PRPC), a political subdivision of the State of Texas organized under Chapter 391 of the Texas Local Government Code, acting by its duly authorized executive director.

WHEREAS, both parties to this Contract are local governments as defined in Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, and this Contract is entered into pursuant to the provisions of said Code which is commonly referred to as The Interlocal Cooperation Act. Pursuant to code 2 CFR 200.318(e) in an effort to foster a greater economy and promote cost efficiency, the non-Federal entity is encouraged to enter into state and local intergovernmental agreements or inter-entity agreements where appropriate for procurement or use of common or shared goods and services.

WHEREAS, PRPC is agreeable to provide grant application preparation and grant administration expertise (if funded) needed by the City for the 2026 Downtown Revitalization Program under the terms and conditions found in this contract.

WHEREAS, this Interlocal Agreement is comprised of Part A (Application Development) services to be rendered at no cost to City and Part B (Project Management) services to be rendered at a cost to be agreed to in an amendment to this contract in the event that the City receives funding under the 2026 Downtown Revitalization program.

NOW, THEREFORE PRPC agrees to provide application development services at no cost to City. The following described application development and management services to the City, to-wit:

A. Application Development

1. Pre-Development (unrelated to project specific development & which may have occurred prior to interlocal agreement under existing PRPC/City relationships)
 - a. Hold and Conduct public hearing required for application submittal.
 - b. Assist in the preparation and presentation of required resolution for application submittal to the Texas Department of Agriculture.
 - c. Assist in pre-application engineering selection including proper procurement methods as dictated by the Downtown Revitalization program implementation manual as appropriate to the City.
2. Provide general advice and technical assistance to the City on application development and regulatory matters.
3. Furnish the City with necessary forms and procedures required for documentation of low/moderate income level qualifications.
4. Assist the City in application preparation and development meeting all grant application requirements.
5. Coordinate with project engineer to development and include required service area maps, cost estimates and other documentation as required by the grant application process.
6. Prepare and publish final notice of application submittal.
7. Final determination on the submission of an application under the 2026 Downtown Revitalization program will be at the City's discretion as noted in their resolution authorizing a local official to submit said application.

B. Project Management

1. Development of details related to project management activities and fees will be specified via an amendment to this contract at such time as the 2026 Downtown Revitalization Application is selected for funding (if selected).
2. The Project Management amendment will include administrative fees as developed in City's 2026 Downtown Revitalization Application and all TDA and HUD required language for administrative contracts at the time of Downtown Revitalization funding award.
 - a. Attachment A to this Interlocal Contract is a contingency draft amendment to be considered to detail administrative deliverables and TDA/HUD language for projects funded under the 2026 Downtown Revitalization program.
3. It is expressly understood that the execution of this interlocal contract does not imply or guarantee City will receive funding under the 2026 Downtown Revitalization program.
4. The execution of this interlocal agreement establishes a contractual relationship between PRPC and City prior to the development of an application to the 2026 Downtown Revitalization program pursuant any interpretation of 2 CFR 200.317-200.326.

In consideration of the services described in the foregoing paragraph, and in consideration of a future amendment to include project management activities and cost, to be rendered by PRPC, to the City, the PRPC agrees that application development activities will be at no cost to the City.

It is expressly understood and agreed by the parties hereto that they are independent contractors; and that nothing contained herein should be construed as giving rise to a partnership or joint venture.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Modification/Amendment:

The City and PRPC may, upon mutual agreement, modify or amend this contract. Modifications, including any increase or decrease in the amount of compensation or scope of services, will be incorporated into this contract and finalized through a signed, written amendment.

Assignability:

The City and PRPC may assign interest in this Contract (whether by assignment or novation) with the written consent of the other.

Termination of Contract for Cause:

If, through any cause, PRPC shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Contract, or if PRPC shall violate any of the covenants, conditions, agreements, or stipulations of this Contract, the City shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice to PRPC of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least five days before the effective date of such termination. In such event, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs and reports prepared by PRPC under this Contract shall, at the option of the City, become its property and PRPC shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any work satisfactorily completed hereunder.

Notwithstanding the above, PRPC shall not be relieved of liability to the City for damages sustained by the City by virtue of any breach of the Contract by PRPC, and the City may withhold any payments to PRPC for the purpose of set off until such time as the exact amount of damages due the City from PRPC is determined.

Termination for Convenience of the City:

The City may terminate this Contract at any time by giving at least ten (10) days notice in writing to PRPC. If the Contract is terminated by the City as provided herein, PRPC will be paid for the time provided and expenses incurred up to the termination date.

Termination for Convenience of PRPC:

PRPC may terminate this Contract at any time by giving at least ten (10) days notice in writing to the City. If the Contract is terminated by PRPC as provided herein, the City will be provided all

finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs and reports prepared by PRPC under this Contract.

Waiver of Extra-contractual Liability

The PRPC shall not be held liable or responsible for the funding selection and project performance determinations by the Texas Department of Agriculture. It is the City’s final responsibility to meet all Downtown Revitalization application requirements and project administration requirements (contingent upon funding) associated with the program.

Severability

Should any one or more of the provisions of this agreement be held to be null, void, voidable, or for any reason whatsoever, of no force and effect, such provision(s) shall be construed as severable from the remainder of this agreement and shall not affect the validity of all other provisions of this agreement, which shall remain in full force and effect.

Interest of Members of a City:

No member of the governing body of the City and no other officer, employee, or agent of the City, who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the administration, construction, engineering or implementation of the Downtown Revitalization Grant award between TDA and the City, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract. PRPC shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

Interest of Other Local Public Officials:

No member of the governing body of the Grant Recipient and no other public official of such Grant Recipient, who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the administration, construction, engineering or implementation of the Downtown Revitalization Grant award between TDA and the City, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract; and PRPC shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

Interest of PRPC and Employees:

PRPC covenants that it presently has no interest and shall not acquire interest, direct or indirect, with the Downtown Revitalization Grant award between TDA and the City, or any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his/her services hereunder. PRPC further covenants that in the performance of this Contract, no person having any such interest shall be employed.

Regional 9-1-1 ESInet renewal

BACKGROUND

The Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network transitioned to an Emergency Services Internet Protocol Network (ESInet) in 2021. The ESInet is a managed IP-based network designed to route emergency traffic digitally and serves as the primary backbone of a Next Generation 9-1-1 Network. In essence, a 9-1-1 call leaves the caller's handset, the call is presented to the ESInet, the ESInet determines the caller's location, and then the ESInet routes the call to the appropriate region and public safety answering point.

The Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC) has provided AT&T with population numbers to determine the pricing throughout the region. The Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) state contract #DIR-TELE-CTSA-002 outlines pricing guidelines through a cooperative purchasing agreement, resulting in a \$24,638.21 monthly recurring cost (\$591,317.04/twenty-four-month total). This is a slight reduction in the previous MRC due to population and rate changes.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the PRPC Board of Directors authorize the Executive Director to enter into a DIR contract with AT&T for 2 years, not to exceed \$24,638.21 MRC, totaling \$591,317.04 over the two-year life of the contract.

Regional Services Interlocal Agreements for Administration of a Hazard Mitigation Grant

BACKGROUND

The Hazard Mitigation Grant Program is authorized under Section 404 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act. The Unified Hazard Mitigation Assistance Grant Programs (HMA) provide grants to states and local governments to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures after a major disaster declaration. The purpose of the HMA is to provide a critical opportunity to reduce the loss of life and property due to natural hazards and disasters and to enable mitigation measures to be implemented during the immediate recovery from a disaster.

This grant program allows sub-recipient management costs to be utilized for the administration of the project. These funds are provided at a 100% federal cost-share; there is no local match required for the administration costs.

Currently, the City of Stinnett has been approved for funding for a generator. We also have several jurisdictions with applications moving through the pipeline. Those include:

WHEREAS, this Contract is made and entered into this the 19th day of March, 2026 by and between the City of Stinnett, after obtaining a vote of its governing body authorizing this contract and the PANHANDLE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION (PRPC), a political subdivision of the State of Texas organized under Chapter 391 of the Texas Local Government Code, acting by its duly authorized Executive Director; and,

WHEREAS, both parties to this Contract are local governments as defined in Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, and this Contract is entered into pursuant to the provisions of said Code, which is commonly referred to as The Interlocal Cooperation Act; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Stinnett is desirous of and the PRPC is agreeable to the provision of project management and consulting and to serve under this contractual relationship to the City of Stinnett in relation to the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) under DR-5487 (Post Fire) through Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) received by the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, PRPC agrees to provide the following described implementation services to the City of Stinnett. These services will be provided in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this agreement.

- I. SCOPE OF SERVICES - Services to the City of Stinnett are to be provided as follows:
 - A. Consulting Management Services
 - 1. Perform routine administrative tasks and correspondence.
 - 2. General Grant Management Services, including but not limited to:
 - 1. Program Set-Up
 - a. Provide general advice with respect to the implementation of the project and regulatory matters.
 - b. Provide technical assistance for the routine tasks to City personnel who will be directly involved in the program.
 - c. Assist the City in developing a record-keeping system consistent with program guidelines, including the establishment and maintenance of grant fund files.
 - d. Assist the City in meeting all special condition requirements.
 - 2. Financial Management (regarding grant fund documentation)
 - a. Assist the City in documenting its ability to manage grant funds as required by the state/ U.S. Treasury.
 - b. Assist the City in establishing and maintaining separate bank accounts, journals, and ledgers as necessary for this project.

- c. Assist the City in establishing procedures to handle the use of any grant funding.
- d. PRPC shall not be financially responsible for any audit findings or for payment for an audit.

3. Construction Management

- a. Assist the City with engineering selection (if necessary), including proper procurement methods as dictated by local, state, and federal law.
- b. Assist the City with construction or vendor procurement (if necessary), including proper procurement methods as dictated by local, state, and federal law.
- c. Attend pre-construction conference and prepare minutes (as needed).

4. Acquisition

- a. Assist the City in determining the necessary documentation of ownership of City-owned real estate, rights-of-way, easements, or other real property rights, if any, which may be required for grant-funded projects.
- b. Assist the City with the acquisition of real property or the rights of use to real property
- c. Maintain separate files for each parcel of real property acquired.

5. Environmental Review (if necessary and at an additional fee as described in Section III)

- a. Prepare an environmental assessment of the project in compliance with environmental best practices
- b. Coordinate environmental clearance procedures with state and local officials and other interested parties.
- c. Document environmental comments.
- d. Prepare any required environmental reassessment.
- e. Prepare the request for certifications.

3. On-Call Technical Assistance to City Staff.

- 4. Assist with the preparation, submission, and processing of all U.S. Treasury reporting requirements.

B. The PRPC will provide to the City of Stinnett the flat rate services of one (1) full-time employee. This individual will be the point of contact and responsible for the delivery of all contracted services to the city.

In addition to the PRPC staff person used to perform the services described above, the PRPC will support the Consulting Manager with internal departmental resources to ensure that these services are fully provided. No additional fee will be incurred by the City of Stinnett. for these resources.

II - Time of Performance and Commitment

This contract will begin on the 19th day of March, 2026, and will proceed through the 8th day of December, 2027, or the performance period of the DR-5487 (Post Fire) through Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) with the City of Stinnett (whichever is greater).

III. COMPENSATION

In consideration of the services described in the foregoing paragraphs to be rendered by PRPC to the City of Stinnett, the City of Stinnett agrees to make the following payment to PRPC from City funds:

A. The PRPC will invoice the City of Stinnett upon completion of services provided at the lump-sum rate of \$1,939.02 under the following schedule:

1) Establishment of Budget/Spending Plan for Grant Funds	25%
2) Establishment of Record Keeping System	25%
3) Filing of all Required Financial Reporting	25%
4) Filing of Required Closeout Information	<u>25%</u>
TOTAL	100%

B. Additional Environmental Review Services- Additional environmental services may be required and arranged through the mutual consent and approval of the City of Stinnett and the PRPC to provide services which exceed those outlined in Section II. Such services will be available at a flat rate lump-sum cost of \$10,000.00. In no case will the PRPC undertake additional services without the consent and approval of the City of Stinnett. Additional Environmental Review Services shall be paid upon completion of services.

IV. TERMINATION CLAUSE

Either the City of Stinnett or the PRPC may terminate this contract in its entirety by providing the other party written notice of termination thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. The PRPC shall deliver to the City of Stinnett all products, reports, and working documents developed prior to the termination date.

V. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

Should any one or more provisions of this contract be held to be null, void, or for any reason whatsoever unenforceable, such provision(s) shall be construed as severable from the remainder of this contract and shall not affect the validity of all other provisions of this contract, which shall remain in full force and effect.

VI. GENERAL PROVISIONS

It is expressly understood and agreed by the parties hereto that they are independent contractors, and that nothing contained herein should be construed as giving rise to a partnership or joint venture.

This agreement will in no way replace or forego any existing agreements or relationships currently entered into by the City of Stinnett and the PRPC. By signature of this agreement, the PRPC is indemnified of any responsibility for the usage of grant funds.

PRPC and the City of Stinnett shall maintain fiscal records and supporting documentation for all expenditures of funds made under this Contract in a manner that conforms to OMB Circular A-87, the Management Standards, and this Contract. PRPC agrees to comply with the retention and custodial requirements for records as set forth in Attachment C of OMB Circular A-102, as supplemented by Section 5.154 of the Management Standards.

PRPC and the City of Stinnett shall give the Comptroller General of the United States, the Auditor of the State of Texas, the auditor of the City of Stinnett, or any of their duly authorized representatives, access to and the right to examine all books, accounts, records, reports, files, and other papers, things, or property belonging to or in use by PRPC or pertaining to this Contract. Such rights to access shall continue as long as the records are retained by PRPC and PRPC agrees to maintain such records in an accessible location.

A Civil Rights Requirement

1. The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, creed, color, sex, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, religion, creed, color, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or retirement, advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of the non-discrimination clause.
2. The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, creed, color, sex, or national origin.
3. The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with whom he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice, to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under Section 202 of Executive Order Number 11246, as amended in 3 CFR 169 (1974), and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
4. The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order Number 11246, as amended, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
5. The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246, as amended, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
6. In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this contract or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be cancelled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order Number 11246, as amended or by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
7. The contractor will include the provisions of Paragraphs 1 and 7 in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Section 204 of Executive Order Number 11246, as amended, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or purchase order, as the contracting agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for non-compliance; provided however, that in the event the contractor becomes involved in or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the contracting agency, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interest of the United States."

PRPC and the City of Stinnett shall fully comply with all relevant provisions of: Equal Employment Opportunity laws, Civil Rights Act of 1964, and Section 3 requirements regarding employment, training, and business opportunities.

PRPC and the City of Stinnett, and no official or employee thereof shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract; and PRPC shall take steps to assure compliance.

Regional Services FY26 State Homeland Security Program Project
Prioritization Approval

BACKGROUND

The Panhandle Regional Emergency Management Advisory Committee (PREMAC) will meet on March 17th to evaluate the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) proposals submitted for consideration under the Panhandle's FY26 SHSP grant program. In total, the PREMAC will evaluate seven applications.

The application evaluation and ranking process that the PREMAC predominantly follows is a Risk-Informed Methodology (RIM), which the committee developed at the start of the grant year. The RIM acts as a guide for the PREMAC in prioritizing projects deemed to be of the highest value to improving the region's ability to prevent, prepare, and/or respond to hazards most apt to impact the Panhandle. This year, the PREMAC will follow the RIM with the caveat that the National Priority Areas are considered, as well as meeting the minimum LETPA percentage of 35%. LETPA projects or Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Activities have a narrow number of project options.

For FY26, we have 6 National Priority Areas (NPA); only three (3) of those have a regional required percentage attached to them. The NPAs and their respective percentage include:

- Enhancing Community Preparedness & Resilience (at least 3%);
- Protection of Soft Target/Crowded Places (at least 3%);
- Supporting Homeland Security Task Forces and Fusion Centers (at least 3%);
- Combating Domestic Violent Extremism (3% under competitive area);
- Enhancing Election Security (3% under competitive area); and
- Enhancing Cybersecurity (apply under SLCGP).

In practice, the introduction of these federal priorities has added a layer of complexity for the region and somewhat undermined the value of the RIM. In prioritizing projects, the PREMAC must now first consider if the NPAs are properly represented and then, as a secondary consideration, work to tack on those projects of greatest concern to the region.

The Office of the Governor's Homeland Security Grant Division (HSGD) has advised planners across the state to operate with the same six NPAs mentioned above. In review of the NPAs from this administration's previous time in office, they are very similar to the current NPAs.

The Department of Homeland Security requires a 14-day turnaround once the HSGD batches applications to the COGs. In an effort to allow the PREMAC and this board to review and approve the prioritization, as well as prevent missing the deadline, we very quickly had the PREMAC meet after applications were submitted. Unfortunately, this also means I will not have the prioritization list until the Board Meeting.

The seven projects that will be reviewed by the PREMAC are summarized as follows (in no particular order):

1. FY26 Regional PANCOS M&O Project

This project covers approximately 52% of the cost of maintaining the regional public safety radio system – PANCOS in this next fiscal year. The balance of funding will be paid with 911 funding (26.5%) and local Fair Share contributions (21.5%).

2. FY26 Non-EMPG Emergency Operations Plan Update Project

This project will enable PRPC staff to continue working with the Panhandle counties to assist them with the maintenance of their local Emergency Operations Plans.

3. FY26 PARIS Maintenance Project

PRPC will maintain PARIS for the region. The PARIS system provides local emergency management officials with a variety of applications, including Mass Notification, that support their operations.

4. FY26 Regional Planning & Coordination Project

This project supports the overall operation of the regional preparedness program, starting with the pre-program year planning through the oversight of the implementation of projects funded under the SHSP. In our case, the project also includes the conduct of the annual regional preparedness conference.

5. FY26 Amarillo Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Enhancement Project

This project builds upon a previous project funded in FY23, when Community Preparedness and Resilience was a new national priority area with a minimum required percentage for each region. With this update, the Amarillo Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) enhancement project will provide needed equipment and supplies for the CERT members when they deploy into the field following an incident. The Amarillo OEM offers CERT training to volunteers across the region.

6. FY26 Amarillo Regional Bomb Squad Enhancement Project

This project covers the purchase of a new EOD disposal trailer and bomb suit/helmet for use in the field by the Regional Bomb Squad as they clear an area for potential bomb threats.

7. FY26 Amarillo Regional Crime Center

This project is for the purchase of state-of-the-art cameras across the City of Amarillo. The new cameras offer AI to increase the speed with which law enforcement can search across the camera footage for potential suspects or even missing persons. The Amarillo Regional Crime Center offers jurisdictions across the region to both share and gather information amongst law enforcement across various technology types.

The PREMAC's preferred prioritization list will be presented to the Board of Directors at the March 19th meeting. Additionally, PREMAC will develop a series of conditional scenarios to provide both the Board and the Office of the Governor's Homeland Security Grant Division with guidance on how the region's funding could be allocated among the seven submitted projects, based on the level of funding ultimately awarded to the region.

RECOMMENDATION:

PRPC staff recommends that the Board consider approving the FY26 State Homeland Security Program project prioritizations recommended by the Panhandle Regional Emergency Management Advisory Committee for submission to the Homeland Security Grant Division of the Governor's Office by the prioritization deadline.

Establishment of PRPC Personnel Policy Committee

BACKGROUND

Article 6, Section 9 of the PRPC Bylaws establishes that the Board of Directors may establish such committees from among its members as it deems necessary. Those appointments shall be made by the presiding officer.

For many months, staff have been working to update and refresh the Personnel Policies document that was last modified on September 23rd, 2021. This document establishes formal rules, guidelines, and procedures to ensure fair, consistent, and compliant treatment of employees across the organization. They define rights, duties, and workplace standards, protecting both staff and the organization. We would love to have 3 or more volunteers who are willing to review our Personnel Policy Document digitally and meet before our normally scheduled April Board Meeting to ultimately recommend the updated document to the Board of Directors for approval. Dissolution of the committee will be automatic with the formal adoption of the updated document.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors recommend, and the Chairperson appoint a group of individuals to serve on a temporary Personnel Policy Committee.
